


Election commitments

- Range of election commitments made in the Making Queensland Safer plan.
- Regional Reset Program- \$50 million over 4 years
- Staying on Track Program - \$175 million over 4 years
- Gold Standard Early Intervention - \$100 million
- Circuit Breaker Sentencing - \$80 million over 4 years
- Youth Justice schools and Crime Prevention Schools - \$80 million



Making Queensland Safer Plan – key commitments




The rights of victims of crime are front and centre.

- **Increasing** the number of police on the beat through retention and attraction.
- **Restoring** consequences for action at the heart of the *Youth Justice Act*.
- **Ensuring** the rights of victims come before the rights of offenders.
- **Diverting** young people from lives of crime by funding early intervention programs.
- **Fixing** the broken child safety and residential care systems to prevent vulnerable kids heading down a path of crime.



The Making Queensland Safer Plan - four key components:

- **Protect**
- **Prevent**
- **Intervene**
- **Rehabilitate**



BEGIN work to tender for the **Regional Reset Program** to put young lives back on the right path.



BEGIN work to tender for the **Staying on Track Program** to divert at-risk young people from lives of crime and rehabilitate youth offenders.




Staying on Track program

100-day commitment: begin work to tender for the Staying on Track program.

Rehabilitate

- \$175m plan to rehabilitate young people in detention and bridge the gap from detention to community.
- 12-month post-release supervision from a community service who is partnered with them while in detention, with at least 6 months' intensive support to reintegrate young people into the community and prevent them from falling back into crime.




Staying on Track program

Rehabilitate

- Post-release supervision will:
 - be tailored to each young person and will offer stability and a pathway to education and employment across the year following release.
 - be designed to help young people prepare for a productive future in employment and community life, with tasks including schooling, TAFE, driving lessons, professional mentoring, volunteering, sports, and extra-curricular activities.

Regional Reset programs


100-day commitment: begin work to tender for the Regional Reset program.

Prevent/Intervene

- \$50M across 4 years to provide a short-stay (1-3 weeks) program to work hand in hand with Gold Standard Early Intervention and Crime Prevention Schools will work with the region to deliver a program to suit community needs.
- Will operate across 9 regions:
 - Far North Queensland
 - North Queensland
 - Central Queensland-Rockhampton
 - Gold Coast-Logan
 - Ipswich-Darling Downs
 - Brisbane
 - Sunshine Coast
 - Wide Bay – **Bundaberg***
 - Western Queensland



Regional Reset programs

Prevent/Intervene

- Intensive support programs, that include a live-in component, that target young people demonstrating high-risk behaviours such as substance use, aggression or truancy.
- Aims to reset habits of at-risk young people with wrap around support and intervention before they become involved in a life of crime.
- Referrals from schools, police, child safety, and parents – not intended for young people on supervised youth justice orders.
- Specialist, holistic, individualised support for at-risk young people with a focus on education, discipline, counselling, training, and employment skills, with programs that include community volunteering, cultural activities, skills, adventure, and sport, including life skills, psychological support, and teamwork.




Gold Standard Early Intervention

Announced commitments: \$150,000 for Our Space Youth Support Centre, Rockhampton.
\$1.8m for Community Gro after hours youth hub, Townsville.

Intervene

\$100M for programs that will work with young people demonstrating early signs criminal behaviour to put them back on the right path.

Objective – to provide pathways to allow courts, schools, child safety, and parents to connect young people with the help they need, when they need it.




Gold Standard Early Intervention

Intervene


Community led initiatives:

- \$50m for Kickstarter Grants for new programs
 - Trial the best early intervention ideas in Queensland.
- \$50m to provide ongoing funding to initiatives with proven successful outcomes
 - Robust KPIs and regular reporting:
 - 90% of young people do not commit crime during the program and in the 12 months following completion.
 - 75% school or training attendance rate or, where applicable, holding down employment.
 - 100% of participants engage in community engagement or outreach activities to build connections into local communities.
 - 100% of participants have regular contact with participants each week of the program.




