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Parole Board Queensland conduct onsite meeting at Lotus Glen Correctional Centre

In a Queensland first, The Parole Board Queensland (PBQ) will convene an onsite board meeting at Lotus Glen Correctional Centre on 9 February 2021.

For the first time, parole matters for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander prisoners will also be attended by the relevant Community Justice Groups.

The President of the Parole Board Queensland, Michael Byrne QC said that the engagement of Community Justice Groups is an initiative of the Parole Board Queensland.

"The purpose it to ensure it is working with key stakeholders to reduce the over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the criminal justice system by ensuring decisions are culturally sensitive," Mr Byrne said.

"We will propose that similar such meetings will occur at other prisons located northern and far northern Queensland in the in the near future."

PBQ was established as an independent fulltime professional board by the Queensland Parole System Review and is an important element of the criminal justice system.

The Board works in conjunction with Queensland Corrective Services (QCS) to protect the community.

For many prisoners, parole granted by the Board is the only way in which the prisoner can be released from prison, prior to their custodial end date.

Parole is not a privilege or an entitlement and is a method to reduce reoffending and plays an integral part in the criminal justice system.

Research supports that paroled prisoners are less likely to reoffend.

PBQ's highest priority when making objective, evidence-based and transparent parole decisions is the safety of the community.
