From Bosnia to Brisbane: a journey of resilience and success

Arriving in Australia from war-torn Bosnia in the early 2000s, Adela Kiveric faced the daunting challenge of leaving behind everything familiar. "Leaving friends, family, culture, and moving to a place where you don't know anybody, don't know how things work, and worst of all, don't know the

language was very challenging," Adela shared.

Despite these obstacles, Adela views the move as the best decision she ever made. Today, she owns Brisbane-based Rethink Psychology, founded in 2020, where her life experiences enhance her understanding, empathy, and compassion for clients.

Her business journey was enhanced by taking part in the Queensland Government's free [Mentoring for Growth](#) program, which she found incredibly helpful and motivational. "The mentors helped me prioritise and take calculated risks. Their support was invaluable," Adela added.

Support for businesses who employ culturally and linguistically diverse people

The [Back to Work](#) program eligibility has been expanded to include culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people who have been unemployed for at least 8 weeks.

With \$20,000 in funding from the [Youth Boost payment](#), Vocational Partnerships Group (VPG) hired Temani who identifies as being from a culturally diverse background.

The [Diverse Queensland Workforce Program](#) is helping migrants, refugees, and international students find jobs across Queensland with incredible success. Almost 80% of these job seekers secured a job with 67% finding full-time employment.

Thanks to the [Industry Workforce Advisor](#) (IWA) program, a small business north of Brisbane expanded while staying true to its values. Kerry Turner, owner of [Murri's on the Move](#)—a First Nations-led driving school—struggled with hiring and lacked a HR framework.

Through the IWA program, Kerry connected with Transport and Logistics expert Angela Mottram. Together, they audited the business, developed HR policies, and created a comprehensive workforce plan. Kerry also secured a \$5000 Human Resources Support Grant through the [Workforce Connect Fund](#).

As a result, Kerry hired two First Nations employees: a driving instructor and an administrative assistant, who is completing a marketing certificate sponsored by Murri's on the Move.

"Workforce planning has been fantastic for the business, and Angela is a powerhouse. This support meant we could carry out business as usual, adding no extra stress to our existing staff."

Empowering voices for bilingual and bicultural workers

A recent workshop held by the Queensland Care Consortium showcased efforts to create secure career paths and improve health outcomes for people from different cultural and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities.

Research shows that having too few bicultural and bilingual health workers can impact health outcomes for migrants and refugees because of language barriers and the lack of culturally-relevant services.

To boost careers and health outcomes for CALD communities, Ethnic Communities Council of Queensland and True Relationships have teamed up to train and increase awareness of the importance of skilled bicultural and bilingual workers.

The initiative is backed by the Queensland Care Consortium, funded by the Queensland Government through Jobs Queensland and powered by the [Good people. Good jobs: Queensland Workforce Strategy 2022–2032](#), celebrating two years of impactful action.

Expressions of interest for the [Tourism Business Digital Adaption Program](#) are now open. Expected outcomes of the rebates include:

- funding to improve digital abilities

- support from digital experts
- free trials of digital products.

Join Gamilaroi man and skilled language researcher Des Crump, and experienced Queensland State Archive staff for a four-day workshop to be held at the [Queensland State Archives](#) from 12-15 November 2024.

The workshop is best suited to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and language workers.

Participants will be introduced to language research in archival collections and will have the opportunity to explore Queensland's largest archival collection, discovering connections between language, culture, country, and family.

Grants

Small Business Exceptional Assistance Grant - Tropical Cyclone Jasper and Southeast Queensland's severe storms.

Many Queensland small businesses faced significant disruptions and losses due to Tropical Cyclone Jasper and Southeast Queensland's severe storms in late 2023 and early 2024.

Co-funded by the Australian Government, the Queensland Government is offering grants up to



\$20,000 through the [Small Business Exceptional Assistance Grant](#).

Eligible small businesses can use the grant to re-establish operations and improve disaster resilience from employee wages to essential costs and professional services.

You need to demonstrate you experienced significant operational impact due to the disaster and employ less than 20 employees. Importantly, a co-contribution from businesses is not required.

You can also access free financial and wellness coaches through the [Small Business Support Network](#).

Applications close **31 October 2024**.
